Participants will appraise its use in specific case-studies and discuss each one from the different perspectives of the experts brought together by the British School at Rome.

Clay's unique qualities as an architectural material, whether brick, terracotta or rammed earth, functional or decorative, will be explored, as will its use in visual arts and crafts in the creation of sculpture, drawing and ceramics.
